Where products sold are specifically marked as Kosher under the supervision of a recognized Orthodox Rabbi, there is then no question as to the ingredients, but when products are sold without any such supervision, the burden is then upon the seller to see that only such ingredients are used as meet the requirements of the Hebrew Law.

Dear Mr. Maxwell:

In answer to your inquiry of May 11, 1951, as to whether or not Stadium Loan Funds may be employed to purchase a canvas cover to be used to protect the playing field at the Memorial Stadium, we wish to advise you as follows.

Chapter 17 of the Laws of Maryland of 1947 (Extraordinary Session) and Ordinance No. 1307, approved June 28, 1950, authorized the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to borrow \$2,500,000.00 for stadium purposes.

Section 2 of Chapter 17 states that the loan funds may be used for -

"the acquisition, by purchase or condemnation, of land or property in the City of Baltimore and establishing, constructing and equipping a modern and adequate stadium and all facilities and appurtenances necessary or useful in connection with the operation of a modern stadium on said land or property or on any
