"The Members of the City Council

Gent:

I beg to be excused for renewing the subject of the butchers leaving their carts empty in Market space; it is usual to take great pains to clean that part where the horses are allowed constantly to stand.

I do not know if the Council intend to pass unnoticed "Aige on Bread", or whether they consider it ineffectual to regulate "the fare of Hacks".

Great complaints are made (and not without cause) of Gates & Doors opening into the streets and alleys, instead of opening into the yards.

An Ordinance has been passed to cause the streets to be labelled; is it not necessary to have the houses regularly numbered.

If the indulgence is continued of allowing goods and empty packages to remain one day in the streets, it will be impossible to keep clear footways; for the grocers and others will uniformly fill the pavement in the morning with Casks &c and never remove them until night.

The Clerks of the several Markets report to me, that instances frequently occur of the meat sellers buying meat brought to market by the country people.

The Fish market is suffering much for want of painting, about one hundred dollars would paint and white wash it, and put it in complete order.

The narrow wheel carts employed in hauling plaster, Salt and Bricks; and Waggon's hauling stone drawn by strong teams carrying very heavy loads injure the pavements more than other vehicles; I think that no cart drawn by more than one horse or waggon hauling stone, ought to be allowed in the City, except
