Sec. 2. And be it further enacted and ordained,
That any person or persons or body corporate,
who may be dissatisfied with the assessment of
benefits or damages which may be made by the
said Commissioners, may appeal to the Baltimore
City Court at the time, in the manner, and after
like notice by the Register of the City, as provided
for in Article 43 of the Baltimore City Code; and
the Collector and Register of the City shall also
perform such duties in the premises as are required of them by the provisions of said article.

An ordinance to condemn and open Douglas street westwardly from the present western terminus thereof to Gay street, opposite to Orange alley and the Odd Fellows Hall.

Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That the Commissioners for Opening Streets in the city of Baltimore, be and they are hereby authorized and To condemn and required to condemn and open Douglas street westerly from its present terminus to Gay street, as follows: to begin for the north side thereof on the west side of Chestnut street in a line with the north side of Douglas street as now public, and to run westerly to the west side of Exeter street in a line with said north side of Douglas street continued; thence from said point on the west side of Exeter street to run with a straight line to Frederick street, toward a point distant northerly seventy feet, measured at right angles to this line from the south-east corner of Frederick street and Etna lane; thence from a point on the west side of Frederick street, in a line with the south line

of the lot on which now stands the Temperance Temple, to run westerly in the direction of said line between the ground now or formerly belonging to A. Schaeffer, the Temperance Temple and Wm. H. Cole, with a straight line to the east side of Gay street; thence southerly on the east side of Gay street, to a point opposite the line dividing the lots now or formerly belonging to P. Brennan and - Morris; thence for the south side thereof, from the east side of Gay street to Frederick street, along the said line dividing the lots aforesaid of Brennan and Morris, being seventy-one feet, eight inches more or less southerly from Temperance Temple, from the east side of Frederick street, at the south-east corner of Frederick street and Etna lane, to run easterly, parallel to and distant seventy feet southerly at right angles from the before described north line straight to Exeter street; thence from the east side of Exeter street, to run on a line with the south side of Douglas street (if extended) to the west side of Chestnut street; and thence northerly on the west side of Chesnut street to the begin-

Sec. 2. And be it enacted and ordained, That any person or persons or body corporate, that may be dissatisfied by the assessments of benefits or Right of appeal. damages which shall be made by the said Commissioners, may appeal to the Baltimore City Court at the time, in the manner, and after like notice by the Register, as provided in Article forty-three of Baltimore City Code; and the Collector and Register of the City shall also perform such duties in relation to streets, as are required of them by the provisions of said article.
